I also experienced life as an international student, living over 4000 miles from home, and so know the struggles and challenges this can bring. I'm the founder and Project Lead of Refillar, a Lancaster-based Social Enterprise run through Enactus. Include. Represent. Diversify

I'm TJ, Tyler to some, and I use he/him pronouns. I'm running to be Bowland JCR's next Mens+ Welfare Representative to push for a more inclusive space within our College and University as a whole. To be able to do this, I'll reiterate my aims throughout my time here: include, represent, and diversify. I'm a second year History student and adore to study social

and cultural modern history, especially the unequal opportunities between genders and class. I have also held the position of Trans Welfare Officer for the LGBTQ+ Forum, making listening a priority to validate the student voice. Furthermore, I have contributed to welfare activities such as holding weekly welfare sessions, bi-weekly walks, as well as bi-weekly coffee evenings for Trans+ students and staff at Lancaster. Outside of University, I've been known to be the 'parent' of the friendship group- putting welfare at the centre of my concerns.

Encouragement needs to be given to make the JCR less of a white, cis gendered, heteronormative, male space. This space should be as diverse as the students it claims to represent. More emphasis and support should be given for diverse groups to run for positions on the JCR, providing a balance of representation. For this to happen, over time, listening needs to occur in order for those students to feel **heard**. During my time as a Welfare Representative, I have 3 primary aims:

- Work closer with liberation groups to provide a more accepting space within our college- including the LGBTQ+, Women+, Mature and PG Students, BAME, and Disabilities forums. As a trans man who suffers from depression and anxiety, being shown that my voice was important was so empowering. Just by listening to those who are less likely to be heard, we can increase mental wellbeing by a serious amount. Thus, impacting how we run campaigns and Welcome Week to make it more inclusive and representative of the students in Bowland College.
- 2. Encourage representation when tackling academic issues- this could include aiding students from disadvantaged backgrounds who are more likely to struggle at university due to welfare issues relating to their socioeconomic/cultural background. For more statistics on this, 93% Club Lancaster publishes statistics on their social media about inequalities around state educated children in comparison to those who attended grammar schools, etc. It will be about finding a balance between supporting those from poorer backgrounds, while still being able to support the welfare of students from higher income families. I.e looking at alternate funding to help with studies. Not only this but I would aim to work with Academic Reps to be able to increase representation across the type of education we offer at Lancaster University, the welfare of students being raised often in staff/student meetings with course convenors. Thus, pushing for the student voice to be heard.
- 3. Inclusive campaigns and events that are accessible for a wider range of students- college spirit is all well and good, but it isn't all about toxic masculinity and heavy drinking. Obviously, this year is different due to the pandemic making socialising a little different. However, that doesn't mean that we can't be considerate when making events and campaigns online. Ways that this can be done include using: alcohol-free alternatives, platforms that use closed-captions, image descriptions to assist those who use screen readers, as well as the consideration that not all students are from the UK

(perhaps using basic translations to encourage international students to get involved in college events).

I am aware that some of the things I've mentioned above are in the works. Yet, I want to consider pushing for representation to include as many students as we can. To emphasise the power of the listening, not just as a tool of communication, but as a tool of power. To be able to help students build on the individuals that they are, with hope and belief in the self as well as the wider community.

This time last year, I was nervously bracing myself to go before the hustings and proposition myself as Bowland JCRs next welfare officer. I think I did a great job then, coming in with overflowing ideas for how the role could be utilised to make college life better for students and for the JCR. In the year since, I have learnt a great deal about the expectations, realities, possibilities and limitations of the role and I can say I'm happy with the progress I have made. Throughout the year I have applied myself in great effort and detail into creating proposals - some which made it to fruition and some which, for many different reasons, never came to be - that would benefit student welfare. With help from the former Women's Welfare Officer, we planned several events such as free massage sessions in Michaelmas term that put the welfare funding we received to great use. By the end of that term I felt I was a comfortable and prepared member of the group and I was teeming with new ideas, but much of that was lost to lockdown and in the 8 months since I believe I have adapted well to the new realities that we face.

It seems unanimously agreed that running welfare-themed events during lockdown and through digital means is incredibly difficult. The ideas are hardly there in the first place, and the attendance is even weaker than it may have been in person. However, I have shown my adeptness through this time; making dozens of high quality and informative graphics both to promote JCR events and with the intention of highlighting days and events of importance to welfare, such as World Mental Health Day and concerning the Black Lives Matter movement in July. I went far beyond the expectations of my role to help with matters like running the E-Founders online gaming tournament which engaged upwards of 40 people in a manner of gaming competitions and helping to create, and to cost and plan pirate-themed party pack for locked-down students. I have always aimed to be a supportive and inclusive member of the JCR who aimed to resolve issues for my teammates and put their wellbeing first. I'm also very proud of successfully recruiting and running interviews for upwards of 50 welcome week reps in order to ensure an engaging freshers experience.

Additionally I had to do portions of this work as the only welfare officer when my teammate had to step away from the role for personal reasons, and I believe I continued to work with consistency and quality.

If re-elected, my hopes for the following year are to:

- Run a sexual health and sex positvity campaign
- Continue to highlight and signpost important issues and resources to students through social media
- Promote student welfare in digital and socially-distanced times by providing fun and inclusive activities for them to take part in
- Aim to use an inclusivity checklist to ensure all events we run are as diversified as possible and accessible to all
- Create a list of green/eco friendly essential items which students can order and have partially subsidised by the college in order to promote sustainable living
- Run a second online gaming tournament, allowing students from across the
 University to engage with each other in a supportive competitive environment
- Zero-tolerance and inclusivity based postering around Bowland halls
- Ensure resources purchased for Bowland events are as sustainably sourced as possible
- Support the restoration and continuation of recreational sports leagues, whose future is yet to be determined.
