International Welfare Officer

I am from Tanzania - but due to COVID-19, I haven't been home for a whole year! I'm approachable, friendly, and passionate about students' wellbeing.

I would normally start by saying that moving to university (especially if you're an international student) is difficult, but we all know that. But this year, with both the stress of moving and the pandemic, things are even more stressful. As an international student, I was unable to go home during lockdown. During this time, I learned a lot about myself and recognize that it was a difficult situation for many. By having this experience, I also

understand how other students are feeling and how we, as a college, could best support them.

As the current International Welfare Officer, these are the things I have accomplished with the welfare team: -

- Supported students' mental health by running weekly drop-in session based on distraction to promote talking (i.e. clay, colouring, knitting, tea etc.). During the pandemic we run virtual BYOM (Bring your own mug), which has been very popular.
 - Worked alongside the welfare team to raise awareness of different wellbeing issues such as Movember.
 - During quarantine, I have helped to create the weekly welfare social media posts.
 - In Welcome Week, I organised a bake-off competition, which was a great way to help flat mates get to know each other.
 - I was in charge of organising the Lunar New Year event. As a collaboration with Pendle College, the British Chinese Society, and the Hong Kong Society, the event was open to anyone and, as it taught us all a lot about the culture, it was a success.
 - Supported by-law changes in the JCR.

I'm running for International Welfare Officer again because I want to ensure that these events and wellbeing sessions still take place as they have a really positive impact on students' mental health. From being on the JCR this year, not only have I learnt a lot, but I've seen the importance of always reaching out and finding ways to start up difficult conversations.

If elected for the position, I would love to introduce the following ideas and events:

- After the success of Lunar New Year, I'd love to run the event again, collaborating with the Hong Kong Society and the British Chinese Society. Not only did they make amazing food, but they taught us so much about the cultural holiday and traditions and I am hoping we could learn even more.
- There are so many cultural holidays which we may be unaware of, but that are very
 important to others. I want to find a way to ensure we celebrate as many cultural
 holiday as possible, so we can continue learning about different cultures and create
 an open, inclusive environment for everyone. The welcoming and diverse community
 of Cartmel is a great strength of the college and is something I'd love to develop
 further.
 - Introduce new campaigns to raise awareness of mental health and other

the weekly drop-in sessions, I want to run an international drop-in session, so students are aware that there is something there for them in case they do want to talk to anyone at home.

Overall, as International Welfare Office, I would aim to continue running the events and campaigns currently in place to the best of my abilities and see what more I can add to support the students. By ensuring that Cartmel is a supportive place, where everyone has a voice and can be listened to, I hope to welcome both old and new members to the college community, helping them in their daily life, and particularly during these stressful times.
