However, I am coming to you for support fulfilling the role of Vice President Welfare, Equality, and Diversity for the next year. I have had a wonderful few months already, and I would be endlessly grateful to continue this throughout the year with your help.

To organise my main manifesto points, I have come up with the acronym C.A.L.M. I will detail them as followed;

Call It Out

One of my key campaigns I want to run as VP Welfare, Equality, and Diversity is the 'Call It Out' campaign. This will be a social media campaign, encouraging everyone to step in and call out the inappropriate behaviour of our peers and celebrating stories about this from members of the college. When at university, it can feel awkward and sometimes embarrassing to call out people within your social circle for racist, sexist, homophobic, ableist, or any other inappropriate behaviour. Being a captain for a county sports team has helped me understand that being an approachable and friendly face at these advertised taster sessions has helped those who may feel nervous or intimidated to try something new. This gave many women a chance to try a new sport without any feelings of anxiety, as they knew the environment they were entering was welcoming and inclusive.

Furthermore, I have been and am continuing to be an active member of County Netball, which I am aiming to contribute more to whilst being a part of the JCR. One aim I had when first taking on women's+ sports officer was to encourage more first years to join sports within County, as I was one of few last year. It can be intimidating joining a new club and meeting new people, especially if you are younger, so promoting sport in a positive way to make students feel even more welcome is something I continue to practice in this role. For example, using the County college sports Instagram page, I have dedicated posts to football, netball, and bar sports, creating a 'GET TO KNOW' series about each of the clubs. I believe this provides a familiar face for those joining and can reduce anxiousness when entering a new sporting environment. I have also created a 'MEET THE CAPTAINS/EXEC' on the Instagram too, so new students can message and approach people in the club for advice and help, because face to face interaction can be more intimidating for some. The wellbeing services at county have been excellent in supporting me in my transition to university. Mindful Mondays along with our wellbeing officers being present during freshers week showed me that the college deeply values student wellbeing. It would be a privilege to contribute my ideas and leadership in this area.

Initiatives from County and the JCR have proven that the college cares about our mental health as students. There are many posters which explain how and where to get help. It is one thing to point someone struggling with their mental health to the right services. However, the process of getting the right help, from being placed on a long waiting list, to having to advocate for yourself, can be stressful. I will develop a system where support can be offered through this process. For example, I propose that email templates or phrases to use on a phone call should be available on County's website to be used when someone is not sure how to begin asking for help, along with advice on healthy coping mechanisms to use whilst waiting to be seen by a professional.

I am passionate about breaking down taboos around sexual health. Our college needs more accessible information regarding STI testing and general sex and relationship advice. Since starting university, I have involved myself in the university's branch of the sexual health charity Sexpression. Working with other volunteers to develop and lead a sex and relationship workshop has taught me how to navigate sensitive topics in an informative but productive manner. As welfare officer, I will help facilitate the conversation around this topic by working with the JCR to set up safe spaces – such as workshops— where students can learn and ask questions free of judgment. Many students aren't aware how or where to access STI testing. I will design posters to put around campus which will provide a guide to the sexual health services available in Lancaster or online and advise how often you should get tested. My aim with these ideas is to help other students feel in charge of their own sexual wellbeing and liberated to make their own informed choices.

Any student can experience challenges. For women+, university life and culture can present particular concerns. As welfare officer, I will strive to ensure women+ feel as safe and empowered as possible on a night out in Lancaster. Spiking is a disturbing yet depressingly real threat. During freshers week, I was really grateful for our freshers reps and members of the JCR who had been educated on how to spot spiking. I would like to bring the topic of spiking into the general educational materials delivered to county freshers (such as the Consent for Students task on Moodle). This wouldn't be scare people, rather to encourage us to look out for each other and ensure everyone in county has a general idea of what to do if they think they or a friend may have been spiked.
